1	So, we're going to do our best though
2	to stick to the schedule. I will try to
3	tell you a little more on that at the end
4	of the day.
5	But if we're not, if things are not
6	starting exactly on time, then there's a
7	reason for it. We are working on the
8	case. 0kay?
9	Now, I want you to hear the times we
10	advise you of because when we're ready to
11	go, we're ready to go. We need to get it
12	done. 0kay?
13	All right. Now you're going to hear
14	from Plaintiff's counsel, Mr. Specter, and
15	thereafter, you will hear from
16	Mr. Levicoff.
17	Mr. Specter.
18	MR. SPECTER: May it please the Court,
19	counsel, Goretzkas.
20	Ladies and gentlemen of the jury,
21	thank you for your patience, yesterday for
22	those of you who came yesterday, and today
23	for all of you. Some of you may not get
24	lunch today, I think. And for that, I'm
25	sure we all apologize.

1	This is Carrie Goretzka.
2	THE COURT: We're going to turn those
3	lights off for you.
4	MR. SPECTER: Thank you, Judge. I'll
5	wait for that. Thank you. Please pardon
6	my back.
7	Carrie Goretzka was a homemaker. She
8	was a daughter, a wife, and a mother. She
9	was a beautiful person inside and out.
10	She was brutally killed by
11	electrocution when a 7200 volt power line
12	installed and maintained by West Penn
13	Power fell on her while she was standing
14	on her property on a clear and sunny day
15	three-and-a-half years ago.
16	We are here because you must fix
17	responsibility for this unspeakable
18	horror.
19	The Defendant West Penn Power denies
20	responsibility. Instead, West Penn Power
21	blames the victim, Carrie Goretzka.
22	Now, as I think you heard during those
23	voir dire statements down the hall, on
24	June 2, 2009, Carrie was at home in West
25	Hempfield with her mother-in-law JoAnn

1	Goretzka and her daughters, four-year-old
2	Chloe and two-year-old Carlie.
3	The family had returned from a
4	vacation in Disney World just three days
5	before. This is one of the last photos
6	taken of Carrie alive.
7	As was customary for Tuesday
8	afternoon, JoAnn was there to help with
9	the girls, and then the entire family
10	gathered for dinner when Mike got home
11	from work.
12	Just before 4:30 in the afternoon, the
13	girls were in the living room watching
14	cartoons as Carrie and JoAnn started to
15	make dinner.
16	All of a sudden, the power went out.
17	The girls got upset. It being a June
18	afternoon with no power, the room started
19	to get hot and stuffy.
20	Carrie went to open the dining room
21	windows to let some air in. She saw the
22	trees in the backyard were on fire. She
23	and JoAnn both saw the fire in the
24	backyard from the dining room, and then
25	they walked into the kitchen to see it.

1	There's the kitchen. There's the view
2	out the kitchen window. If you look up on
3	the big screen, you can see my laser
4	pointer, there's the kitchen window where
5	they looked out, and here is the view they
6	saw out the kitchen window.
7	Again, on the big screen, the power
8	line had fallen in these big pines, and
9	they were on fire.
10	Here is the view of the house looking
11	back from the same trees. Power lines
12	come up through here. The trees are up
13	above. Here is the view from the kitchen
14	window. Over here would be the living
15	room window. This is the bedroom window.
16	So, they looked out these windows.
17	They saw the trees up here on fire from a
18	fallen power line.
19	Carrie tried to call 911 from the
20	house phone, but it did not work because
21	the power was out.
22	So, Carrie went to the garage to get
23	her cell phone from her purse to call 911.
24	Now, at the Goretzka house, you
25	couldn't get cell phone service inside the

1	house. The cell phone wouldn't work
2	inside the house. Cell phone service was
3	best in the side yard over here off the
4	driveway. That's where she went to make
5	her call.
6	She made three attempts to call 911,
7	and here are the phone records. Here you
8	can see two at 4:28 p.m. and one at 4:29
9	p.m. to 911.
10	She made three attempts to call 911
11	unsuccessfully standing in the side yard,
12	apparently.
13	JoAnn stayed with the girls in the
14	house while Carrie was outside. The girls
15	were upset. They started asking, "Where
16	is mommy? Where's mommy?"
17	So, JoAnn went down the steps in the
18	living room out to the driveway to see
19	where Carrie was.
20	There she saw Carrie laying in the
21	side yard having been struck by the fallen
22	power line being electrocuted and on fire.
23	Carrie was laying right here. Here is
24	the driveway. Here is the side of the
25	yard.

1	So that you get a sense of this, this
2	distance, this is only about 14 feet. So,
3	one, two, three, four not quite five
4	from the edge of the driveway to where
5	Carrie was laying.
6	JoAnn ran across the driveway to try
7	to rescue Carrie. She got as far as the
8	grass, and then she was thrown backward
9	and down by the force of the 7200 volts of
10	electric power, and she landed on the
11	ground, which was itself energized by the
12	fallen power line, and she burned her
13	fingers.
14	She picked herself up, she screamed at
15	the top of her lungs, "Help me, help me."
16	And neighbors came to assist.
17	This is the Goretzka neighborhood
18	taken from what I think many of you will
19	recognize as that Google Earth Program you
20	might see on your computer. Let me give
21	you some orientation.
22	Here is the Goretzka house. Here
23	would be the dining room. Here is the
24	living room. Here is the kitchen. That's
05	the window out of which they look from the

1	kitchen. There is the window that they
2	would have looked out of from the dining
3	room.
4	There are the trees back here in the
5	backyard that were on fire. Here is that
6	backyard pool. I'm sure some of you saw
7	an above-ground pool.
8	The power line ran from across the
9	street to this pole. The lines ran along
10	the side yard of the property to a pole
11	back here along the course below them
12	cable wires, telephone wires.
13	Now, Tim Harper lived right down here
14	just off the street. He was working at
15	his computer at home. He was a volunteer
16	firefighter for over 20 years. He
17	responded immediately. He came running
18	up.
19	Don Thoma, also a volunteer
20	firefighter who lives in this house right
21	here, he heard the screaming. He came
22	out, drove his truck down, parked it here,
23	came on up.
24	Mike Thornburg, mailman delivering
25	mail right over here, got in his mail

1	truck, came around the corner, came to the
2	scene.
3	Michelle Siegel out in her garden
4	right over here. Right about here, just
5	off the screen. She came running up the
6	street.
7	While all that was happening, while
8	they were responding to JoAnn Goretzka's
9	scream, Chloe and Carlie came outside of
10	the house, and they watched what was
11	happening to their mother on this spot.
12	Eventually, Carrie was taken from the
13	yard by ambulance to a MedEvac Hospital.
14	It had been flown into West Hempfield
15	Elementary School up the street. She was
16	then airlifted to UPMC.
17	She had a complete left arm and
18	shoulder amputation at the hospital and
19	several surgeries to remove pressure from
20	her limbs before dying three days later on
21	June 5, 2009. Carrie Goretzka was
22	39-years-old.
23	How and why did this power line fall
24	on a clear and sunny day and come into
25	contact with Carrie Goretzka?

1	First, it is undisputed that the line
2	fell from a separation that occurred
3	inside a splice like this at the top of
4	this pole.
5	So that while Carrie and JoAnn saw the
6	fire back here, the break actually
7	occurred here and brought the line down
8	across the length of the side yard.
9	Here is that pole I just showed you.
10	This pole right here. Just to give you
11	some orientation, this is south down here.
12	This would be east. This would be north.
13	This would be west.
14	So, this pole is on the southeast
15	corner of the property.
16	Here is that pole. Here is the splice
17	up in the air with no power line attached
18	to it going north. That's where the line
19	fell. It came out of that splice.
20	Here is that splice up in the air on
21	top of that pole, the line fell out of
22	that splice on that day, a clear and sunny
23	day.
24	When it fell, it came into contact
25	with those trees in the backvard setting

1	them on fire. That's what Carrie and
2	JoAnn saw at 4:30 in the afternoon on that
3	day just before the fire was created in
4	those trees.
5	At the same time, and unknown to
6	Carrie, it also fell onto these phone
7	lines in the side yard. It fell from up
8	here down onto the phone lines in the side
9	yard above where Carrie was injured.
10	You can see that's where she was
11	struck. You can see her shoes here that
12	came off in that sequence.
13	You recall I mentioned the phone
14	lines. Here is another view of those
15	phone lines.
16	The power line came down and it
17	initially hung up in these phone lines
18	before toppling down on top of Carrie.
19	Now, Tim Harper. He was the volunteer
20	firefighter who lived just south of
21	Carrie, the fellow working at his
22	computer. He heard the screaming. He was
23	on the scene within a minute or two. He
24	lived right down here.
25	He saw these phone lines on fire. He

1	saw this, what I'll call junction box
2	you see it right here dripping hot
3	plastic, hot molten plastic.
4	That, of course, occurred from the
5	power line laying on top of the telephone
6	lines and the junction box for a period of
7	time long enough to catch them on fire and
8	cause the junction box to be dripping hot,
9	molten plastic even up until when Harper
10	got there.
11	The next day, Verizon came out, and
12	this is the Verizon truck. They repaired
13	the phone lines right where the power line
14	had come down on top of them.
15	Now, after this incident, this phone
16	line now has two junction boxes. That
17	probably is not the technical word for it,
18	but that's the word that I call them. Two
19	junction boxes, whereas before it just had
20	the one. There's no second junction box
21	here. This has been added.
22	It was added when the phone lines were
23	replaced after the power line had come
24	down on top of them.
25	Now, West Penn Power, as I'm sure you

1	can appreciate, is a public utility.
2	Because it has the license and privilege
3	to supply high voltage electricity and the
4	privilege to string their thousands of
5	high voltage lines everywhere across
6	public and private property throughout the
7	community, the law requires West Penn to
8	use the highest degree of care practical
9	to protect people under or near their
10	lines.
11	Everyday most of us walk or travel
12	under power lines dozens of times. We
13	don't give it a second thought. We trust,
14	as we must, the safety and the integrity
15	of those lines.
16	We will show you that West Penn Power
17	failed to use the highest degree of care.
18	Now, as I said, the line separated at
19	its connection with its automatic splice
20	at that pole by the street, right up here.
21	These splices, they function like
22	Chinese finger traps. You put the line in
23	and the splices will grab it. Here is a
24	drawing of what's called a Fargo GL
25	series, also called Hubbell who makes the

1	splice. This is how it works.
2	You stick the this is called
3	conductor. That's the trade term.
4	Conductor means power line. You put the
5	conductor in the splice, and these jaws
6	grip the wire so it will stay.
7	You're going to see a video of how
8	these splices are installed. It was made
9	by the manufacturer. It will show you the
10	exact steps that need to be taken to
11	install one correctly.
12	Now, we will establish, I think to
13	your satisfaction, that a power line
14	shouldn't fall on a clear and sunny day.
15	It wouldn't ordinarily fall on a clear
16	and sunny day in the absence of the
17	telephone pole being hit by a truck or a
18	tree falling on top of it or some other
19	trauma like that. It wouldn't ordinarily
20	fall unless there was some problem in the
21	installation or the maintenance of the
22	line.
23	We're going to tell you what the
24	problem was. The line fell because the
25	West Penn Power linemen who hung this line

1	in 2004, just five years before this
2	tragic incident, they failed to properly
3	clean the wire with a wire brush before
4	installing it into the splice.
5	The manufacturer of the splice,
6	Hubbell, has specific installation
7	instructions on the back, on this back
8	right here. On this back. These
9	instructions say, "Be sure the conductor
10	is clean (wire brush). " Very specific.
11	In case a lineman were to forget when he
12	takes the splice out of the bag and the
13	instructions are right there for him to
14	see, "Use a wire brush."
15	West Penn Power has a specific
16	standard in their book for their linemen,
17	the book that in 2004 was on the
18	instructions with the linemen to tell them
19	what to do that says, the wire has to be
20	cleaned with a wire brush.
21	It even tells you that if you don't do
22	it, you could have a failure, the line can
23	fall. That's what a failure is.
24	When a power line, a live 7200 volt
25	power line falls, that can kill.

1	Now, brushing with a wire brush is
2	very important. Just as this says, you
3	must use a wire brush to clean through the
4	oxides. An unclean conductor will set up
5	overheating and eventual failure of the
6	splice.
7	Everything that West Penn Power told
8	their men in their Bible on their truck is
9	correct on this subject.
10	If you don't clean with the wire
11	brush, it will set up overheating and
12	eventually, the line will fall. That's
13	called a burn-down. It just literally
14	burns down.
15	That's exactly what happened here.
16	The line broke after it heated up, and the
17	steel core could no longer support the
18	load of the line, and this is the tip of
19	the splice. Do you see that red tip right
20	here?
21	There's the tip of the splice, and
22	that's where the line was inside. That's
23	where it burned down and fell because it
24	wasn't cleaned properly five years earlier
25	when it was put up.

1	After this incident, we got, along
2	with West Penn Power, the parts that had
3	come down, the various pieces of the power
4	line and the splice and everything else
5	that went along with it. It was evident
6	that that power line had not been cleaned
7	with a wire brush.
8	Now, Chris Havlik, could you please
9	stand up? Thank you, sir.
10	This is Mr. Christopher Havlik. He
11	works for the Hubbell Company in, I
12	believe, Alabama. They're the
13	manufacturers of this splice.
14	He was the man who when West Penn
15	Power had some issue with a splice failing
16	or a burn-down or what happened that we
17	had a failure of a power line, they would
18	call Mr. Havlik, and they would ask him,
19	"Would you please take a look at what
20	happened and tell us why we had this
21	incident?"
22	West Penn is and has been a customer
23	of Hubbell's, as you all understand, for a
24	long time. They relied upon Hubbell to
25	tell them what would go wrong with a part

1	or around a part that Hubbell would
2	provide.
3	Mr. Havlik came here, came here twice,
4	went to the scene, looked at all of the
5	fallen parts, looked at all of the wire,
6	looked at what the linemen had to say when
7	they sat and testified under oath in
8	what's called a deposition to explain what
9	happened.
10	He concluded that the reason the line
11	fell was because it hadn't been brushed
12	with a wire brush when it was put up in
13	2004.
14	Now, wire-brushing is very, very
15	simple. It just involves taking a wire
16	brush, there are lots of them. This is an
17	example of one, and closing it and running
18	along the conductor and cleaning it before
19	you put it up so that it looks nice and
20	shiny and new.
21	Now, what did the linemen have to say
22	from West Penn Power? You're going to
23	hear from them in this case. But we have
24	taken their depositions, so, we think we
25	know what they're going to say to you

25

1	because this is what they said to us.
2	There were two men who went out and
3	put up this line on June 23, 2004. Not
4	quite five years before this incident
5	occurred.
6	T. C. Jones was one of the linemen.
7	Now, they don't remember which one did
8	which part of the line five years earlier.
9	But he will tell you, as he told us,
10	that, no, he didn't always use a wire
11	brush to put up a power line.
12	He'll say, Okay, that's what the
13	standards say, but you have to understand
14	that's not how I was trained. I was
15	trained by my trainers at West Penn that
16	it was okay not to use a wire brush.
17	I was told, he will say that you can
18	use another tool. You can use the back of
19	a knife to clean a power line. Putting
20	aside what it said in their standards
21	book, putting aside what it said on the
22	package for the splice, he'll say I was
23	told you could use the back of a knife.
24	Jeffrey Falo, the other lineman who
25	installed the line, he'll say, I was

1	trained to use a wire brush. That's how I
2	was trained, and I always did. But the
3	man who he identified as his trainer says,
4	No, I didn't tell my men they had to use a
5	wire brush. I said, You could use other
6	tools, but we will tell you that West Penn
7	is right in their standards, you have to
8	use a wire brush. We will tell you that
9	Hubbell was right in their standards, you
10	have to use a wire brush.
11	Mr. Havlik, the manufacturer of the
12	product, will tell you you got to use a
13	wire brush. Because just as you shouldn't
14	use a knife to clean your teeth, but
15	rather you should use a brush to clean
16	your teeth, you shouldn't use a knife to
17	clean a power line, you should use a
18	brush.
19	Now, as you might expect, West Penn
20	Power has a standards department
21	responsible for this splice and this power
22	line.
23	The person in charge of the splice at
24	West Penn is a Miss Jill D'Angelo.
25	Miss D'Angelo knew before June 2,

1	2009, before this incident occurred, that
2	linemen were not cleaning the wires with a
3	wire brush.
4	Let me give you an example of what I'm
5	talking about. Here is a an e-mail
6	exchange between she and her boss, Haven
7	Bearley.
8	Mr. Bearley was the manager of the
9	department, the manager in standards at
10	West Penn Power. And they had had an
11	incident in April of 2004. They had a
12	line come down.
13	Who do they turn to to tell them why?
14	They turn to Mr. Havlik to tell them why
15	it came down.
16	Mr. Havlik told them this, you will
17	see the documents, "It came down because
18	your linemen poorly prepared the power
19	line. That's why it came down."
20	He told them that, and Mr. Bearley,
21	the manager, said, "Good explanation from
22	Chris Havlik on the article in
23	Transmission and Distribution. That's
24	T&D.
25	If I recall correctly. Bearley says to

1	D'Angelo, the majority of our automatic
2	splice failures and this is an
3	automatic splice, just so we're clear
4	had been attributed to poor conductor
5	preparation.
6	That means we're not cleaning the wire
7	and improper splice installation, that
8	means we're not putting the splice into
9	the we're not putting the wire into the
10	splice correctly.
11	He asks, and we requested video from
12	manufacturers on conductor preparation and
13	automatic splice installation that we
14	could use at the training school.
15	What you're going to learn is these
16	men, they weren't brought in and told,
17	We're having a problem here. The linemen
18	weren't told, We're having a problem at
19	West Penn Power. We're having we're
20	having high voltage power lines falling.
21	Live power lines falling because you
22	fellows aren't cleaning the lines
23	correctly. They didn't do that.
24	Let me just remind you the date of
25	this exchange. April 29, 2004. That line

1	was put up in the Goretzka's yard on June
2	23, 2004. It was put up seven-to-eight
3	weeks later, right in the wake of the
4	managers in the Department of Standards of
5	West Penn Power knowing they had a problem
6	with the proper installation of their
7	power lines.
8	Now, you might be wondering, well, is
9	there somebody at West Penn Power that
10	goes around to check on the integrity of
11	these splices and these connections? Do
12	they just put them up there and leave them
13	up there indefinitely?
14	Here is the answer. Yes. That's the
15	answer.
16	You might be wondering, well, that
17	Goretzka house, that looks like it was
18	built before 2004. Was there a power line
19	there before 2004 that services their
20	house? Did that line come down in 2004?
21	And, yes, it did. It came down five years
22	earlier. It came down in the backyard of
23	their house back where Carrie and JoAnn
24	saw it on fire in 2009.
25	It came back it fell down five

1	years earlier in their backyard.
2	That's what happened when it came down
3	five years earlier. It came down, and it
4	was live. It made a heck of a burn in the
5	ground, as you can see.
6	Here is 9 if you look at the big
7	screen, here is the fire that was created
8	by the power line when it came down in
9	June of 2004 in their backyard. Here is
10	their backyard pool.
11	Those are the tall pine trees in the
12	back that caught on fire five years later
13	when the line came down again.
14	Now, why did that line fall in 2004?
15	West Penn Power failed to determine
16	why the line fell in 2004. They also
17	failed to determine why after it fell it
18	was permitted to burn like this live on
19	the ground for all this time.
20	Why didn't it trip a fuse? Why didn't
21	it shut off?
22	These are serious failures in 2004.
23	Now, a fuse is a device that turns off
24	the power if the power if the fault
25	current on the line gets too high.

1	What is fault current?
2	Fault current is a load on the line, a
3	power load on the line higher than what's
4	expected on the line.
5	The word fault is used because the
6	current is too high. So, a tree branch or
7	a squirrel coming into contact with a line
8	for instance, it can cause a fault
9	current, because it draws excess power.
10	In 2004, the line fell. It did a lot
11	of damage to Mike Goretzka's house, or not
12	his house, his yard.
13	Mike Goretzka raised a concern with
14	the power company about that. They wrote
15	him a letter.
16	They said to him in the letter, "Your
17	claim for damage to your yard caused by a
18	line coming down has been referred to this
19	office for investigation. I apologize for
20	delay in responding."
21	This is July 15, 2004.
22	"On July 12, 2004, one of our contract
23	foresters went to your residence to
24	investigate this incident. He has
25	informed me that he could not find why the

1	line came down."
2	So, they sent a tree guy out to see
3	was it a tree that brought it down.
4	Apparently not.
5	So, West Penn Power, they didn't know
6	why that line came down in 2004. It
7	wasn't a tree, apparently.
8	Reading on, "He stated that the Laurel
9	Silver Maple is starting to grow close to
10	the line, but the phase that burned down
11	is the outside phase."
12	In other words, there's a couple of
13	power lines there, the tall tree, Silver
14	Maple, it wasn't growing close to the line
15	that came down. So, it wasn't the maple.
16	But they don't know why it fell.
17	I discussed this incident with our
18	engineer, and he has explained that the
19	reason the line did not de-energize was
20	due to the fact that there wasn't enough
21	fault current to trip the fuse.
22	There wasn't enough fault current to
23	trip the fuse.
24	West Penn didn't send out a planning
25	engineer to check if a different lower

1	fuse should be used. They didn't change
2	the system so that this wouldn't happen
3	again.
4	What happened in 2004 was the line
5	fell. They didn't know why it fell. It
6	fell, and it was live. It didn't kill
7	anybody in 2004. Why? Because they were
8	lucky.
9	They didn't figure out why it fell,
10	and they didn't fix the problem that
11	caused it to remain live after it had
12	fallen.
13	If they fixed the problem in 2004 such
14	that when the line fell, it would
15	de-energize, then in 2009 when the line
16	fell, it would have de-energized, and it
17	would not have electrocuted Carrie
18	Goretzka.
19	But they didn't do that. So, her
20	death ended up being caused by their
21	failure to do what they should have done
22	to investigate the cause and the solution
23	to the line falling in 2004, and it was
24	burning hot when it fell.
25	Her death was caused because when they

1	put the line back up in 2004, they didn't
2	clean the wire when they put it back
3	when they put it into a splice.
4	So, over time, it began to burn hot,
5	and then it burned down in 2009, and again
6	when it came down, it was live. It hit
7	the telephone wires, it was live. It hit
8	the trees, it was live. It hit Carrie, it
9	was live. It hit the ground, it was live.
10	And it killed her.
11	West Penn Power's conduct destroyed
12	Carrie Goretzka's storybook romance.
13	Carrie and Mike were high school
14	sweethearts. When he was 17-years-old, he
15	had hernia surgery, and he wasn't allowed
16	to drive to school. He figured this was a
17	very good thing, because he figured he
18	could ask this young woman named Carrie to
19	give him a ride to school.
20	He knew exactly what he was doing when
21	he did that. Their courtship began, and
22	on May 4, 1996, this couple got married.
23	In 2004, they were blessed with their
24	first little girl Chloe, now a second
25	grader at Queen of Angels School in West

1	Hempfield.
2	Two years later, they had their second
3	little girl, Carlie. She's now in
4	kindergarten at Queen of Angels School.
5	Before starting their family, Carrie
6	worked in billing. She rose to the level
7	of regional billing director for
8	Southwestern Pennsylvania.
9	She stopped working at about the time
10	she had Carlie. She planned to return to
11	work once Carlie started grade school.
12	Mike Goretzka's schedule is just as
13	impressive.
14	Mike is now the senior vice president
15	for Family Home Health Services and Three
16	Rivers Hospice. He has worked for that
17	company for 23 years.
18	But Mike didn't start off in
19	management. He started off sweeping the
20	floors like his father before him at that
21	company. He's worked there 23 years.
22	He's worked hard. He's earned his degree,
23	and he's worked his way up to now help run
24	the company, which provides home health
25	care and hospice services.

1	You're going to learn a lot about the
2	Goretzka family. You're going to learn
3	that they are one close-knit family.
4	They're doing everything they can to
5	give those beautiful little girls a proper
6	upbringing.
7	But it is hard for a dad, even this
8	dad, it's hard for this dad to do what
9	their mother could only do.
10	As you might expect, the trauma of
11	Carrie's passing has had a profound impact
12	on Chloe and on Carlie.
13	They have severe problems with
14	attachment. They're very worried that
15	their dad will be taken from them as was
16	their mother.
17	Mike sleeps on the floor every night
18	with them in the same room, and he has
19	everyday since their mother passed away.
20	If he tries to get up in the middle of
21	the night and go to sleep in his own room
22	or another room, they sense that, and they
23	make him stay.
24	Their wounds from this kind of an
25	experience are obviously more than

1	physical. There are emotional wounds as
2	well.
3	Mike suffers from severe depression,
4	and post-traumatic stress disorder.
5	These girls, two and four years old
6	when this happened, and JoAnn Goretzka
7	cannot and will not forget what they
8	witnessed.
9	I regret that we need to talk about
10	this, but we need to talk about this.
11	They saw Carrie being shocked before
12	they were whisked away to a neighbor's
13	house.
14	Thankfully, they did not have to
15	observe what Carrie endured for most of
16	the next 45 minutes.
17	If you can look up at the big screen,
18	here's where live wire was in the ground
19	laying on the ground, kind of like when I
20	showed you that picture before of what it
21	looked like in 2004 when that line hit the
22	ground.
23	The wire became when it came down
24	onto Carrie, it became entangled all over
25	her body.

1	This is the impression of her body
2	laying in the ground. You can see that
3	the ground was burned from her body which
4	itself was burned.
5	You're going to hear from the
6	witnesses. I regret that that's going to
7	be a painful experience for all of us, but
8	they will tell you that the energized line
9	became entangled all over her body.
10	Regrettably, that line remained
11	energized, and it continuously shocked
12	Carrie for about 20 minutes, with multiple
13	wounds on her body of entry of electric
14	shock and exit of electric shock.
15	They'll tell you, the witnesses, that
16	Carrie, regrettably, was conscious. And
17	she lay on the ground moaning in pain.
18	And they'll tell you that they had to
19	stand there, the witnesses, the neighbors,
20	helplessly because the volunteer
21	firefighters kept everyone back because
22	the line was hot. Because they didn't
23	have the proper implements to get the live
24	line off of her.
25	The volunteer firefighters didn't want

1	the same thing to happen to anyone else
2	that was happening to Carrie, and that had
3	happened to JoAnn when JoAnn went to
4	rescue her and was thrown to the ground,
5	and herself was burned.
6	Tim Harper, that volunteer
7	firefighter, when he came to the scene, he
8	quickly got a fire extinguisher. He
9	sprayed the phone lines to put the fire
10	out on the phone lines.
11	He saw that Carrie was on fire.
12	Regrettably, so did the children.
13	He put out the fire on Carrie with a
14	fire extinguisher. But they couldn't stop
15	the electric current until finally a man
16	from West Penn Power came and use what
17	they call a hot stick. It's this thing
18	here. They dragged the line off of her,
19	and shut off the power.
20	But then it was another 25 minutes
21	that she was conscious before the first
22	responders, the EMTs were able to render
23	her unconscious in the process of getting
24	a tube down her throat intubating her.
25	You'll hear from the burn surgeon from

1	UPMC, the fellow who used to run the burn
2	center at UPMC Mercy.
3	He has treated hundreds of high
4	voltage electrical burns. He will tell
5	you what you probably already know, which
6	is that these kinds of burns, it's about
7	the worst thing that can happen to a
8	person.
9	Now, what are they going to say? What
10	is West Penn Power going to say?
11	They are going to blame Carrie
12	Goretzka.
13	Now, please note that when they make
14	this argument, they have the burden of
15	proof. They're arguing that she was,
16	what's called, contributorily negligent,
17	and that's their burden to prove that to
18	your satisfaction, that she was at fault,
19	and she caused her own gruesome death.
20	They're going to highlight that this
21	was an unwitnessed incident, and it was.
22	No one saw the line come down onto Carrie.
23	They may say in fact, they have
24	already told you this, they told it to you
25	in that voir dire statement, that she

1	walked into the power line. They are
2	wrong.
3	The evidence is that the power line
4	hung up on the phone lines up high here,
5	18 feet high, when it first came down.
6	Then it toppled down onto Carrie.
7	They, apparently, are going to say that
8	what happened was, yeah, it came down
9	about 18 feet high, and it lodged in this
10	tree here, and there's a burn mark in the
11	tree, and yes, there is. We agree with
12	that. It came down onto the power lines
13	into the tree at pretty much the same
14	height. Not a coincidence.
15	But they're going to say, No, it
16	didn't come down to the phone lines.
17	Apparently they're going to say that.
18	I don't know. He doesn't share with me
19	his opening speech before he gives it.
20	But that's apparently, from looking at
21	their expert reports, what they're going
22	to say.
23	They're going to say, No, it didn't
24	come down into the telephone lines. It
25	came down also into this small tree here.

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So, it was draped between this tree and this tree, and it made a burn mark in this tree. That's how we know it came down into that tree. And it was flaming. This tree was flaming they're going to say, and this tree was flaming. And she walked over in between these two flaming trees, and she touched her left hand to the power line.

You're going to have to decide whether vou believe that. Or whether you believe what we're going to tell you, which is it came down into that tree, the big tree on the side, came down into the phone lines, then it toppled down onto Carrie, and in the process, it toppled down into right next to her, right next to her, it came down into this small tree and made a burn mark, and eventually toppled on down to the ground.

There will be no evidence that Carrie Goretzka saw this power line draped between these allegedly two flaming trees and that she voluntarily walked over there and touched a power line with her left

1	hand.
2	They may say that, Well, there's
3	probably an entry wound on her left hand.
4	That may be. Why? Lots of reasons.
5	No. 1, she could have seen the line
6	coming down and put her hand up, had the
7	line struck her left arm.
8	You're going to learn she,
9	regrettably, had a staggeringly horrific
10	injury to her left forearm. Horrific. It
11	burned through to the bone. Nothing left
12	but the bone.
13	So, when that line came down, she may
14	have put her hand up, and a piece of line
15	may have struck her left hand. Or the
16	line is wrapped around her you will
17	hear about that from the witnesses on
18	the ground for 20 minutes, and some piece
19	of that power line may have come into
20	contact or even near her left hand.
21	Because, of course, you don't actually
22	have to get to touch the line to get
23	electric shock from 7200 volts. She got
24	an electric shock from ten, twelve feet
25	away, just on the edge of the driveway and

1	the side yard.
2	They may say that she should have
3	stayed in her house. Your wife should
4	have stayed in her house, they're going to
5	say, Mr. Goretzka.
6	We're going to ask you to consider the
7	evidence that we're going to bring to you,
8	which is actually pretty simple and
9	straightforward.
10	The power went out. She's in charge.
11	She's in charge of her land, of her house,
12	of her two small children who are upset,
13	of her mother-in-law, of herself.
14	She's got a duty to her neighbors.
15	Maybe not a legal duty, but a duty as a
16	neighbor. The trees in the backyard,
17	they're on fire. This had happened
18	before.
19	She calls 911. You will have to
20	determine whether it was reasonable for
21	Carrie Goretzka to try to call 911. And
22	she couldn't because the power was out.
23	So, she went to get her cell phone.
24	It doesn't operate inside the house. The
25	reception is best in the side yard.

1	That's where she went to make those calls,
2	and it's undisputed that she made three
3	attempts to call 911, and then she was
4	electrocuted.
5	You going to have to decide whether
6	you as the members of this community,
7	judging the facts, and what a person ought
8	to do that's reasonable, whether it was
9	manifestly unreasonable for her to do what
10	she did, to try to summon emergency help
11	for what was a true, sudden emergency, not
12	of her making.
13	West Penn Power will not meet their
14	burden of proof to show that Carrie
15	Goretzka caused her own horrific death.
16	Now, if you determine at the end of
17	this case that West Penn Power failed to
18	use the highest degree of care, which is
19	what the law requires them to do, just so
20	we're clear, the highest degree of care,
21	highest, not reasonable, highest, and if
22	you find that that caused Carrie's death
23	we, His Honor, are going to ask you to
24	determine what damages should be awarded
25	to compensate the Goretzka family for what

1	they have endured, what they are currently
2	enduring, and what they will endure.
3	Now, the law provides that you are to
4	award the family damages in several
5	specific categories. I want to go through
6	those with you.
7	I want to go through those with you.
8	First of all, let me say this to you, I'm
9	not going to you heard a lot of this
10	discussion in voir dire.
11	We are not going to I should say
12	voir dire was that jury selection process.
13	We're not going to come and say to
14	you, "You should award us X amount of
15	money." We're not going to ask you for a
16	specific amount of money. You are to
17	decide what you believe is fair and
18	reasonable.
19	His Honor will tell you that at the
20	end of the case.
21	That is really your only guide, what
22	you believe is fair and reasonable.
23	These things, most of them,
24	regrettably, they're not susceptible to
25	mathematical calculation or precise

1	certainty.
2	You as the voice of the community are
3	going to have to decide what you believe
4	is fair and reasonable.
5	That's all I'm going to ask you to do;
6	just to be fair, and just to be
7	reasonable.
8	Now, what are those categories? First
9	of all, there is Carrie Goretzka's pain
10	and her suffering and her disfigurement.
11	It's her pain and suffering for the 20
12	minutes of being continuously shocked and
13	the pain for about 25 minutes thereafter
14	before she was intubated when she was
15	conscious, and her disfigurement that she
16	experienced during that time.
17	It is the economic loss. And this
18	actually is capable of being quantified,
19	arising from her passing.
20	I told you about Carrie's career. She
21	was headed back to work. She had a
22	salary. She would have had an expectation
23	of receiving a salary like that, perhaps
24	better, perhaps worse.
25	You'll have to decide what she would

1	have likely made, how long she would have
2	likely worked, what her fringe benefits
3	would have been, and what is the economic
4	value of the loss of her household
5	services around the house.
6	From that, you will deduct something
7	called personal maintenance. Personal
8	maintenance is not what a person spends on
9	themselves, just so we're clear.
10	Personal maintenance is defined under
11	the law, and His Honor will tell you about
12	this at the end of the case, is the
13	minimal amount required for subsistence.
14	That is personal maintenance.
15	So you will look at what she would
16	have earned, what are her fringe benefits,
17	what is the loss of her household
18	services, and you will deduct from that
19	what you find to be the amount that she
20	would have spent on minimal subsistence
21	for herself had she lived.
22	There will be her medical bills for
23	the three days that she was in the
24	hospital.
25	Then there will be the claims on

1	behalf of these children. Chloe and
2	Carlie. They have separate claims that
3	you must consider, members of the jury.
4	First is their emotional distress
5	through having witnessed what happened to
6	their mother.
7	That's a specific, recognized claim in
8	Pennsylvania where a close family member
9	witnesses an injury to someone else in
10	their family.
11	Then, of course, there are the damages
12	for each of them arising from not having a
13	mother. I don't need to spend anymore
14	time with you on that today.
15	Then there is JoAnn Goretzka, and what
16	is fair to award to her. She has two
17	separate claims.
18	She has the burns to her hands caused
19	by the downed power line when she went to
20	rescue her daughter-in-law, and there is
21	her emotional distress from having
22	witnessed what happened to Carrie.
23	Then there is what's fair for Mike
24	Goretzka. What's fair to award to him
25	for and they call this in the law, they

1	have this concept of loss of marital
2	consortium they call it.
3	You know, the comfort, the aid, the
4	companionship, the closeness, all the
5	things that go into a marital
6	relationship.
7	What is the fair compensation to him
8	for the loss of those things?
9	Now, I'm sure that when you have
10	listened to what I've had to say here for
11	this past hour and ten minutes, and I beg
12	your pardon for being so lengthy, I'm sure
13	that you have felt sympathy for the
14	Goretzka family.
15	You may even feel sympathy for some
16	aspect of West Penn Power, or you might
17	during the course of the trial in the
18	course of our questioning of some of the
19	witnesses for West Penn Power feel some
20	degree of sympathy.
21	But please understand that, No. 1,
22	respectfully, Mike Goretzka is not here
23	for your sympathy. And neither is his
24	mother.
25	Sympathy should play no part in your

1	deliberations on this case. I know His
2	Honor will tell you that.
3	What His Honor will tell you and what
4	we feel strongly you should do is decide
5	the facts, decide whether Carrie's death
6	was needless, whether it was caused by
7	West Penn Power's failure to exercise the
8	highest degree of care practicable.
9	And then to carefully and respectfully
10	consider each of the elements of damages
11	and come to a consensus among you as to
12	what the right financial compensation is.
13	We are not permitted to seek anything
14	other than that. We're not allowed to
15	come here and seek some sort of other kind
16	of remedy. We can't turn back the clock,
17	and we can't give this woman life again.
18	Oh, but could we? But we can't.
19	So, what the law says is that we have
20	to try to fix the next best thing, and
21	that's to see what is an amount of money
22	that roughly compares to what the loss has
23	been. To try to use financial
24	compensation to make the people who have
25	heen injured whole

1	I'm sure when you hear that from me,
2	you recognize that that is highly
3	imperfect, but that's the best that we can
4	do, and that's what the law will require
5	you to do.
6	I know you have taken an oath to try
7	this case well and true, as Ray
8	administered it to you not two hours ago.
9	That's what we're going to ask you to do.
10	I also know that when I sit down,
11	Mr. Levicoff, who is a highly skilled
12	attorney, as you would expect, is going to
13	stand up and he's going to tell you all of
14	the things that he's going to say that I
15	said that were wrong or if not wrong, were
16	incomplete. Or some other adjective.
17	I don't, unfortunately, have the right
18	to stand up and say, No, what I said was
19	correct, and what he's saying is wrong.
20	I'm not allowed to do that. Not until
21	I speak to you in my closing speech when I
22	talk to you about what the evidence has
23	proven.
24	But I ask you when you're listening to
25	what he tells you and when he's giving you

1	what he wants you to believe their version
2	of the facts, I ask you to keep in mind
3	what I have told you, and then I ask you
4	to listen carefully to the evidence,
5	because we're going to bring you this
6	mountain of evidence.
7	We're going to bring you Mr. Havlik as
8	the first witness to tell you why this
9	line came down.
10	We're going to bring you the
11	neighbors. Not all of them. We're going
12	to bring you neighbors.
13	We're going to bring you first
14	responders. We're going to bring you the
15	appropriate experts in the various areas.
16	You're going to hear from a lineman
17	from West Penn Power and the supervisors.
18	You are going to hear from Miss D'Angelo,
19	who knew two months before this line came
20	down in 2004, why their lines were coming
21	down.
22	We're going to bring every one of them
23	into the courtroom, and we're going to
24	give them a chance to tell you what their
25	side of the story is.

1	Then you're going to have to decide
2	who was right and who was wrong. Thank
3	you very much for your attention.
4	THE COURT: Okay. Now, Mr. Levicoff
5	has previously asked me would you like
6	ten minutes to set up?
7	MR. LEVICOFF: Ten minutes, Your
8	Honor.
9	THE COURT: So, we're going to break
10	for ten minutes while Mr. Levicoff gets
11	his display set up. Okay? Thank you.
12	Remove the juror.
13	Wait a minute. Nobody move.
14	(Jurors exit courtroom.)
15	THE COURT: Whoever is coughing, I
16	can't tell who it is, I would like you to
17	get some water in you, get your throat
18	lozenges, something of that nature.
19	If you cannot overcome your cough,
20	please don't return to the courtroom. I'm
21	not trying to be mean, but these lawyers
22	have a lot invested in this case. It's a
23	big case. They're trying to get their
24	points across. We don't want the jury
25	distracted from any point they may make.
